



### **A Remarkable Community**

Four years ago, Hood launched Forging the Future: The Campaign for Hood College, a \$50-million capital campaign, the most ambitious in the College's history. Today, we are happy to share that, thanks to a remarkable community of generous Hood donors, we are approaching our new goal of \$65 million, \$15 million more than the original target, which we surpassed in 2021.

Thanks to donors who supported Hood through this campaign, the College has strengthened its impact in the community and in higher education and has advanced its academic mission by:

- Establishing the George B. Delaplaine Jr. School of Business and launching Data Driven Frederick, an analytics center that provides data to regional businesses, nonprofits and other organizations to inform policy development and decision-making that benefits the Frederick community. It also gives Hood undergraduate and graduate students opportunities to learn and work with community partners, analyzing economic trends, health information and more.
- Founding the Ruth Whitaker Holmes School of Behavioral and Health Sciences, a strategic undertaking at a time when the demand for nurses and other health professionals is dramatically increasing. Through a partnership with Frederick Health, the hospital and healthcare system that is one of Frederick County's largest employers, Hood is strengthening and expanding health-related academic and experiential programs including nursing, public health, social work, nutrition and counseling.
- Providing funds for Hood's endowment to support scholarships, high-impact learning opportunities, faculty research and new academic programs.

Still, there is more to be done—and we are asking all members of the Hood community to join in this groundbreaking effort to support the College and expand its mission. In addition to the initiatives noted above, expanding and modernizing the Hodson Science and Technology Center remains a priority. The three-story addition will provide more classrooms, specialty labs, study space and faculty offices, all necessary to accommodate the College's growth—and its growing prominence in the sciences. Hodson will house the new Biomedical Research and Training Center, where students will receive specialized hands-on-training to prepare them for cutting-edge work in medical research and biotechnology.

True to our mission, Hood College remains committed to serving as the college of choice for students seeking an excellent, holistic, liberal arts and sciences education. We offer this in an inclusive environment that prepares graduates for personal and professional achievement leading to purposeful lives of responsibility, leadership, service and civic engagement.



# What *Forging the Future* Looks Like in the Hodson Science and Technology Center

Extraordinary faculty, students and programs deserve equally extraordinary spaces. Transforming the Hodson Science and Technology Center will provide the classrooms, specialty labs, study spaces and faculty offices needed to accommodate the College's growth in the sciences, overall, and specifically health sciences. The renovated facility will also house the new Biomedical Research and Training Center that will support Hood students' education in biotechnology and biomanufacturing. Graduates will be prepared to advance their knowledge, address the most pressing issues in global health today and conduct cutting-edge research in the biomedical field.

Our Vision: Building on Hood's core strengths in the sciences and liberal arts, the renovated Hodson Science and Technology Center will foster growth in academic programs and integrate research with practice, leveraging our rigorous curriculum and our extensive partnerships in research—locally, regionally and globally.

Hood has been a leader among our peer liberal arts colleges in developing new academic programs in response to market demand and regional workforce trends. The Bachelor of Arts in Sustainability Studies, launched in fall 2021, required specialty labs to support the three areas of focus—water, energy and food. A computer science lab, constructed in an annex building, partially accommodated growing graduate programs in cybersecurity and bioinformatics. Nursing has become

the largest major with an enrollment demand that exceeds current capacity.

Hood successfully launched an undergraduate degree in public health that is poised to be Maryland's only accredited Bachelor of Arts program in the field, while our new graduate program in nutrition science just earned national accreditation. Soon, we will add a master's in health informatics.

### Create the Biomedical Research and Training Center

The Biomedical Research and Training Center will provide a unique opportunity for students to receive specialized hands-on training, coinciding with current industry needs. Led jointly by Hood College faculty and scientists from regional companies, the Center will place students at the forefront of innovations in science, technology and healthcare to ensure they have the expertise needed to propel the biotechnology industry into the next generation. Partnerships include Gilead Sciences subsidiary Kite Pharma, Leidos Biomedical Research, AstraZeneca and the State of Maryland, to name a few. The Center will prepare students to enter the workforce immediately after graduation, possessing the skills necessary to meet pressing needs in manufacturing, research and development of new therapies and treatments.

Through conferences, symposia and other collaborative programs, the Center will open Hood's campus to a world of renowned scientists, scholars and students.

At the helm of the Center will be an executive director, whose position is being funded through an endowment established from Ruth Whitaker Holmes '55, H'93, Ph.D., and a State of Maryland E-Novation grant.

#### **Hodson Expansion and Renovation**


The proposed expansion to the Hodson Science and Technology Center is a three-story, 32,000-square-foot addition that will provide the instructional and laboratory space needed to accommodate program growth. It will also include significant renovation of existing classrooms and lab spaces. Consistent with Hood's commitment to high-impact teaching and learning, the expansion and renovation will create "wet lab" training spaces, conference and meeting spaces, classrooms with virtual technology, additional offices, an 80-seat auditorium and a greenhouse.

The design concept reflects Hood's dedication to preparing graduates with the skills necessary to successfully pursue careers in science and technology. Among those skills are interdisciplinary thinking, creativity and teamwork. Spaces in the new building have been purposefully designed as so-called "maker spaces," which will encourage students from all disciplines (biology, biochemistry, chemistry, computer science, mathematics, coastal studies and sustainability studies) to work in partnership and develop innovative solutions to complex problems.

# How Philanthropy Has Changed Students' Lives

A top priority of the *Forging the Future* comprehensive campaign is to increase resources for high-impact learning—internships, study abroad, service learning, fieldwork and research with faculty.

High-impact learning opportunities carry significant costs, for both students and faculty. Internships and research experiences often occur in the summer, when many students must work full time to earn money for college tuition. Students and faculty incur costs related to travel, housing and supplies. Further resources are needed to support curriculum development and advising. To encourage our students' full engagement in high-impact learning, Hood offers financial assistance for these programs. However, the needs of students and faculty far outpace current College funding.

Here are a few examples of how this support has enriched the experiences of three Hood students traveling abroad:

#### Linda Redd '23

Linda is a pre-dental studies biology major and Chair of the Board Scholar. She recently received funding to participate in a mission trip with the International Medical Relief organization. Linda traveled to Poland, where she has been providing aid for Ukrainians displaced by the conflict with Russia. At a refugee camp, Linda has worked alongside dentists from around the world. In addition to offering dental care, she teaches classes to children about oral hygiene.

Linda says working with a vulnerable population is challenging but rewarding, and she is grateful that Hood has given her this opportunity to make a difference and help people, while gaining real-world experience in the field of dentistry. Linda says dentistry combines her love of science with the desire to care for people who have special needs.

### **Greighson Rowe '22**

Greighson received her degree in psychology and Spanish. She studied abroad in fall 2021 at the University of Seville, Spain. Living with a host family, she was fully immersed in the language, which built her confidence her language skills and expand her academic experience. This was Greighson's first visit to Europe, and she was able to travel to France, Portugal and Germany.

Greighson believes the experience was invaluable to achieve her long-term goal of becoming a mental health professional with a focus on Spanish-speaking and ethnic minority populations.

### Stephanie Villalobos '23

Stephanie is a double major in law and criminal justice and French. She is a member of the Honors Program and spent the spring 2022 semester in Paris, France. The opportunity to study abroad allowed Stephanie to achieve many goals that she had set for herself. First, to become more comfortable with public speaking,




