Hunger at Hood?

Although we are all fortunate to be part of a welcoming, resource-rich campus like Hood, we know that a handful of students, especially those without a campus meal plan, struggle with food insecurity from time to time. There is a new campus initiative designed to support such students—both graduate and undergraduate. Dubbed "Hood Pantry," this pilot program aims to provide modest food staples and hygiene items to students with temporary or long-term need via an anonymous system. 


What to Expect




