

Hood received \$1 million from congressionally directed spending via the Fiscal Year 2023 Omnibus Appropriations Bill secured by U.S. Senators Ben Cardin and Chris Van Hollen (D-Md.) to fund the Michael S., P'09 and Marlene B. Grossnickle Young '76, H'14, P'09 Data Driven Frederick Center as well as the Biomedical Research and Training Center.

An extraordinary bequest of more than \$1 million dollars from Ann Lewis Snyder '49 and William Snyder, trustee emeritus, established the endowed Lewis and Snyder Scholarship Fund for undergraduate students, with preference given to Maryland and Pennsylvania high school graduates.



Rising to the Challenge

Across the duration of the campaign, contributions from students, alumni, faculty, staff and community partners notably increased.



A COMMUNITY THAT GIVES BACK

Faculty and staff engagement grew from 27% to 45%, well above the 10% national average.

PRESIDENT'S CLUB PAYS IT FORWARD

The President's Club recognizes donors who invest \$2,000 or more per fiscal year—membership increased 61% during the campaign, adding more than 100 new members.





STRONG GOVERNMENT AND FOUNDATION PARTNERS

\$41.2 million—55% of the campaign total—was raised through foundation grants and government support.

ESTATE GIFTS LEAVE A LEGACY OF GIVING

\$4.4 million—6% of the campaign total—came from alumni estate gifts, a tremendous show of confidence from multiple generations of Hood alumni.


THE DELAPLAINE FOUNDATION MULTIMEDIA CENTER

STATE OF MARYLAND GRANT TO PROVIDE RENOVATION AND EXPANSION OF THE HODSON SCIENCE AND TECHOLOGY CENTER

Hood College received \$6.8 million from the State of Maryland to renovate and expand the Hodson Science and Technology Center. This planned renovation and expansion will allow Hood to meet the needs of both existing and new programs. It will include wet labs, training spaces, virtual-equipped classrooms, a greenhouse and an 80-seat auditorium. The addition will include the new Biomedical Research and Training Center, which will house STEM workshops, advanced biomedical research courses and training in the newest advances in biomedical manufacturing.

ALVIN BOBER CHEMISTRY FUND ESTABLISHED

The Alvin Bober Chemistry Fund was established by Hope Bober Corrigan '81 in loving memory of her father, an esteemed chemist. This endowed fund will be used to purchase new equipment and supplies for students and faculty who are engaged in meaningful research and discovery in chemistry and biochemistry.


