## **Community Partners**

As part of a five-year, \$1.45 million grant\*, Hood College will increase the number of qualified STEM teachers who are skilled in culturall relevant practices and desire to work in high-needs schools by providing scholarships, specialized preparation and mentoring to biology, chemistry



and mathematics students who complete a STEM major and teacher certification, and then become teachers in high-need schools in Frederick County.

This program creates a partnership with Frederick Community College and Frederick County Public Schools and will serve as a model of collaboration and result in collective institutional know-how for preparing culturally proficient secondary STEM teachers and a sustainable pipeline for future STEM educators.

Hood College Staff Council was created to provide staff representation in College policymaking. Within the first year, Staff Council has improved campuswide communication and developed an onboarding program for new employees Staff are empowered by having their ideas put into action and by having a voice in mportant College procedures



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As part of the Summer Research Institute, students are paired with faculty for a one-on-one research project. Students engage in research in the laboratory or in the field for up to eight weeks over the summer, taking their educational opportunities beyond the traditional classroom setting.

In summer 2017, Brielle Rozmus '19 and Nailah Russell '18 joined Hoda Zaki, Ph.D., Virginia E. Lewis Professor of Political Science, in her research on the League of Women Voters of Frederick County. They set out to better understand the impact the League has had on Frederick politics and civic life, and its connections to Hood College. By reviewing literature and documents, conducting interviews, and observing League members in action at community meetings with Dr. Zaki, Nailah and Brielle have not only learned the importance of civic engagement and empowerment, but have also acquired valuable research skills.
